England Netball is immensely proud to introduce our new approach to netball for primary aged children, Bee Netball. Bee Netball is all about friendship, inclusion, fair play, support and participation. It's not about how good you are, it is about how hard you try to Bee.



Bee Netball enables all children to be involved in their own way; be it with a 'sting in their tail' or simply in a way that 'gets them buzzing'



In addition to all this, Bee Netball is built upon a robust age & stage framework supporting children's learning and development in a number of areas including personal development, social development, physical literacy as well as netball.

Bee Netball is relatively straight forward and does not have large space or equipment requirements. England Netball's approach to competitions now gives options and opportunities to involve all kinds of children in a simple child-centred way.

The first entry point is through either an Area or County round (depending on County), followed by the Regional and National round. These events are delivered by County and Regional Netball Associations and England Netball.

It should be noted that Bee Netball will be being introduced from June; we anticipate that provision will grow over time with England Netball staff working to influence and activate this area of the programme.

Competition card 3: Year 7 girls

Primary or Secondary: Primary

Name of competition:

Netball

Age Group:

Year 7 girls

How to enter:

Via SGO or identified contact

Tournament format:

Can be played either home and away, or at a central venue depending on your local facilities. If playing in a central venue, teams to play 2-3 matches per night.

Home & Away fixtures or a central venue competition/league is most suited but SGOs can select this based on local situation

Simple rules:

- · Can be played indoors or outdoors.
- Seven players on a court.
- Play is started with a centre pass which must be caught or touched in the centre third.
- A player must pass or shoot within three seconds and obey the footwork rule.
- A ball is out of court when it, or a player touching it, touches the ground or an object outside the court. The line counts as part of the court. If the ball hits the post and bounces back into court, it is still in play.
- The throw-in is taken at the point where the ball crosses the line. Any player allowed in that part of the court may take the throw-in and must stand outside the court with both feet behind the line.
- Obstruction
- > Player with ball: the nearer foot of the defender must be 0.9m (3ft) from the landing foot of the player with the ball, or the spot where the frst foot had landed if one has been lifted. The defender may jump to intercept or defend the ball from this 0.9m (3ft) distance.
- Player without ball: the defender may be close, but not touching, providing that no effort is made to intercept or defend the ball and there is no interference with the opponent's throwing or shooting action.
- A player is offside if she/he enters any area of the court in which she/he is not allowed.

Roles for young people:

If you have students wanting to get involved in volunteering in the School Games then we have our Young Netball Organiser and Into Officiating Award courses designed specifically to support students wanting to volunteer in events of officiating.

How can regularity be achieved?

Netball can be offered on a regular basis through a league format. This could be home and away fixtures or at a central venue, depending on your local facilities.

How can depth in competition through extra teams be achieved?

Netball can be offered on a regular basis through a league format. This could be home and away fixtures or at a central venue depending on your local facilities.

Alternatively, have a plate and a cup competition to engage more young people. Your Netball Development Officer can offer some different formats like Crazy Catches and other equipment to help run alternative competitions alongside traditional tournaments.

Use of student leaders to support B, C, D (and beyond!) teams can be encouraged and workshops such as Young Netball Organiser can help to up skill these students, contact your local Netball Development Officer for more information on this. Use of alternate forms of netball may also suit some students, for example Fast 5 Netball with its exciting and fun variations of the rules.

The route from here to County Final - Inter School Competition (Level 3)

Winners and runners-up (decided locally) should progress to County Final - Inter School Competition (Level 3). County Final - Inter School Competition (Level 3) should happen in either the spring or summer term.

Think Inclusively!

A brightly coloured netball can be used for visually impaired players. Zones can be used to support children with additional needs; consider time on the ball and number of steps allowed.
